relax and watch the scenery as the train rolls along at an average 85km/h.

I'm mesmerised by the emptiness of the Nullarbor, stretching to the horizon on either side. Changes are subtle - red sand hills to orange stone country, mallee scrub to saltbush stubble. Distant camels are silhouetted against the sky. Somewhere out there to the north is the Maralinga nuclear testing site of the 1950s.

Cook, once a thriving railway siding of 200 people until privatisation in 1979, is now a derelict village of four. The weedsprouting swimming pool and dangling basketball hoop hint of better times, but poignant murals and quirky signs depict life beside the rail line with a generous slug of outback humour.

The next shady trees are 500km further on at the tiny outpost of Rawlinna. Bordering one of Australia's largest sheep properties, the million-hectare Rawlinna Station, the stop is an occasional disembarkation point for jackaroos. (New this season, guests can dine under the stars beside the station.)

Kalgoorlie-Boulder is home to the largest single open cut mine in the world, the Super Pit, so I take the evening Gold Rush tour to Hannans North Tourist Mine. I gain some perspective on the mine by the size of the machinery, hopping in the wheel of an enormous dump truck for a photo.

Awaking on the last morning, the outback is but a memory, barren earth replaced by bustling suburbia on the outskirts of Perth. But I'm thrilled to have at last crossed the vast expanse of the Nullarbor.

WHAT TO SEE IN ADELAIDE

Stroll along North Terrace for grand colonial sandstone architecture. Continue on to the Botanic Gardens and take a walk through the avenue of fig trees planted in 1866. Learn about winemaking on a self-guided tour of the National Wine Centre, or if time permits, take a day trip to one of South Australia's famous wine regions. Visit Adelaide Central Market for fresh local produce and delicious coffee. Take a free tour of Haigh's Chocolate factory and catch a tram to the beachside suburb of Glenelg. For arts and crafts, head to the Jam Factory, a purpose-built, non-profit studio complex supporting design and craftsmanship, where you can watch artists at work, before purchasing some unusual handcrafted items in the gift shop. southaustralia.com

WHAT TO SEE IN PERTH

Admire the contrasting architecture on a city walk taking in the Town Hall, Government House and the Perth Mint, where you can watch gold being poured on a tour. Then head to the Bell Tower, home of the Swan Bells (including the only royal bells known to have left England) before taking a cruise on the Swan River. Combine magnificent views and Aboriginal history on an Indigenous Heritage Tour of Kings Park Botanic Garden, home to an enormous 750-year-
